

# Health Volunteers Overseas Programs Summary: 2019

102 active projects where 380 volunteers completed 425 assignments, totaling 6,769 volunteer days served.

89 e-volunteering assignments totaling 3600 hours of remote mentoring and clinical consultation.

Over 3,280 health professionals received training and professional mentorship.

## **Programs**

- 11 site assessments conducted
- 8 new projects opened

- E-volunteering 3600 hours across 13 specialties and over 52 projects
- 128 volunteers received funding to off-set volunteer expenses
- The Skin of Color Society became an HVO organizational partner
- 92% volunteers interested in volunteering with HVO again in the future
- 93% of volunteers surveyed would recommend HVO to a colleague
- 16 health professionals from HVO project sites received scholarships
- 45% repeat volunteers

#### **On-Site Coordinator's Perspective**

79% of on-site coordinators (OSC) completed a 2019 survey.

- OSCs reported, on average, spending 7.3 hours/month on HVO related work.
- General areas on impact reported include:
  - 90% observed improvements in staff skills
  - 85% observed improvements in patient safety
  - 82% observed increased efficiency of care
  - 80% observed improvements in documentation/recording processes
  - 53% indicated cost savings was a positive outcome of HVO's activities
  - 41% indicated staff retention was a positive outcome of HVO's activities
- OSCs reported implementing new/revised protocols as a result of working with HVO
  - 35% new standards of patient care
  - 33% clinical procedure guidelines
  - 32% training curricula

#### **Accomplishments: A Snapshot**

- Anesthesia: The nurse anesthesia program in Laos earned recognition by the International Federation of Nurse Anesthetists; and, the first two nurse anesthetists graduated from this program.
- Dermatology: Four students completed a Master's of Medicine in dermatology in Uganda
- **Hematology:** The projects in Siem Reap, Cambodia and Peru conducted routine e-volunteering/case conference calls between volunteers and the site (1/wk and 1/mo, respectively)
- Internal Medicine: The project in Kampot, Cambodia reported improved quality of care (due, in part, to HVO), the hospital noted a 28% increase in outpatient care and a 50% increase in inpatient care.
- **Nursing:** The project in Hai Duong, Vietnam developed program and year of study outcomes for the new curriculum as well as integrated case studies for first level students
- Oncology:
  - Two medical oncology fellows graduated from the National Academy of Medical Sciences in Nepal. They also published several manuscripts and received ASCO merit awards.
  - In Bhutan, palliative care home visits are now conducted 3/wk by a team of
     3 palliative care nurses, a physician and a social worker.
  - The first two fellows graduated from the gynecologic oncology fellowship program and passed the International Gynecologic Cancer Society exam -Bhaktapur Cancer Hospital, Nepal.
- Oral Health: In Nepal, digital x-rays were introduced for use in all departments which has drastically improved the quality, efficiency, diagnostic ability, and safety of the imaging.
- Pediatrics: Development of a triage system for the OPD at Laos Friends Hospital for Children
- Physical Therapy:
  - The Haitian Physical Therapy Association, an organization supported by HVO, was inducted into the World Confederation of Physical Therapy
  - Developed a twelve-month plan for an online course for the PT faculty at the University of Yangon, Myanmar (exclusively though e-volunteering)
